

Bronte Village Streetscape Study What We Heard Report July, 2024



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1.0 Introduction

The Town of Oakville is planning to enhance the streetscape in the main street and historic village area of Bronte Village. This will involve the development of a public realm study and a streetscape plan which will include recommendations for improvements and implementation.


The Public Realm Study and Streetscape Plan has been initiated with the first round of public engagement. The Town of Oakville (the Town) has launched a web page (Bronte Village Streetscape Study Web Page) where information on the project and the team's work in progress is posted. In the first three phases of the project there have been one-on-one conversations with residents, meetings with the Business Improvement Area (BIA), Town staff, local councillors and the public. A summary of what we've heard so far is summarized in this report.

The project is being undertaken in seven phases. The team has completed the project initiation with the launch of the web page, start up meetings with Town staff and assembly of background information. During phase two and three the team completed their early inventory and analysis of existing conditions such as land use, building character, streetscape features, trails and cycling facilities, parks, squares, open spaces, parking and traffic. The team shared their inventory, analysis and thoughts on an overarching public realm framework at a June public information centre.

1.1 What is a Public Realm and Streetscape Study?

Public Realm Study

Public realm refers to publicly accessible and highly visible spaces located along our streets, boulevards, pedestrian ways, parks, plazas and the interface with buildings. So many vital activities that are part of our daily lives take place in public spaces, shaping our day-to-day experiences. These spaces make our neighbourhoods vibrant places to live, and are crucial to the community's participation in public life. Investing in the public realm is essential in creating harmonious and socially inclusive communities.

The public realm study will identify existing amenities and opportunities for physical improvements to enhance the spaces and connections between the traditional commercial main street and surrounding community.



Parks and Open Space in Bronte Village

Streetscape Study

Streetscape refers to the physical environment of a street. This includes its visual character and how the space is used by pedestrians, patrons, cyclists and motorists. The streetscape of a town shows the natural and built environment of the street, enhancing the experience of that space. Streetscapes also envision the public life of the residents, workers, patrons and visitors in the area, becoming the success criteria for the public life of a town.

The streetscape concept plans (design and layout) will include street trees and other landscape materials, special paving, lighting, street furniture, public art and wayfinding.

2.0 Conversation with the Bronte Business Improvement Area

- · Project has generated excitement.
- Smallest BIA with 175 businesses.
- Focus on beautification, winter décor, planters/ baskets, and activating Market Square with heavy event programming.
- 75 days of activation on the waterfront and square, including music and library events.
- Town handles waterfront permitting; BIA manages Muskoka art chairs (80 in the park, 50 in commercial area).
- Market Square hosts various events, including a curling rink and a Sunday farmers market (58 vendors, expecting 40 per Sunday), but faces infrastructure issues like insufficient hydro and no public bathrooms.
- Event period runs from July 7 to August 25.
- Private parking lots are common, with some businesses offering parking for customers.
- Development applications are supported, aiming to welcome 3,000 new residents.
- Current vacancy rate is 7%.









3.0 One-on-one Conversations with Residents



June 3, 2024

On June 3, 2024, a consultant team member had eighteen 15-minute conversations with Bronte Village residents as an opportunity for the community to voice any concerns, ideas or thoughts on the project. The following points below are a summary of what we heard during these conversations:

Parking and Walkability

- Issues with predatory towing, particularly near the lake and Bronte south of Lakeshore.
- Lack of parking is an issue, suggestions for more free parking spaces and better integration of parking with retail areas.
- Desire for more pedestrian-friendly spaces to encourage walking and shopping locally.

Retail and Development

- Concerns about high retail rents driving out small businesses and making it hard for new ones to open.
- Importance of maintaining a variety of shops to serve the community's needs.
- Emphasis on keeping the small-town feel with lowrise buildings rather than high-rise developments.
- Mixed opinions on new developments, with some residents welcoming it if it includes amenities and retains community character.

Community and Streetscape

- Desire for a cohesive community feel similar to Downtown Oakville.
- Suggestions for consistent design elements such as heritage lights, benches, and bollards to enhance the streetscape.
- Calls for more green infrastructure, including trees and planters, to make the area more attractive and environmentally friendly.

Waterfront and Public Space

- High value placed on access to the waterfront and its amenities.
- Suggestions for improving the waterfront area to make it more usable and attractive for residents and visitors.
- Interest in increasing cultural and entertainment offerings along the waterfront, such as outdoor concerts and markets.
- Desire for more interesting light standards, better plantings, and more Muskoka chairs throughout the village.
- Enhancements to the Bronte Market Square, including a bigger water feature and more seating areas to create a sense of community.

Traffic, Cycling and Pedestrian Safety

- Need for better bike lanes and pedestrian crossings, particularly over bridges and busy streets.
- Intersection of Lakeshore and Bronte is a bottleneck; suggestions for a roundabout to improve traffic flow and pedestrian safety.
- Introduction of a centre median along Lakeshore for pedestrian safety and removal of slip lanes.

Village Atmosphere and Character

- Residents appreciate the village feel and vibrancy, emphasizing the need to maintain it amid new developments.
- Concerns about "wall to wall condos" creating a tunnel effect; preference for stepped-back building designs to preserve the open feeling.

June 26, 2024

4.0 Input Received Through the Public Information Centre #1

62 participants

Two public information centres were held on June 26, 2024. The afternoon session took place between 2:30 pm and 4:30 pm at the Church of the Epiphany (141 Bronte Road) with a total of 30 participants. The evening session took place between 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm at the Walton Memorial United Church (2489 Lakeshore Road) with a total of 32 participants.

Both sessions began with a presentation on the project, followed by small group discussions where the community was invited to share comments and ideas on parks, open space, streetscape, moving around, as well as the activities, landscaping, and types of uses they would like to see at Market Square.

What Other Types of Uses in the Immediate Area Would Support the Market Square?

The following is a summary of what we heard:

Parking and Traffic

- Parking is a major concern; unresolved parking issues affect residents and visitors.
- Shift suggested from prioritizing cars to prioritizing cyclists and public transit, though this won't solve current car problems.
- Ongoing issues with predatory parking practices and upcoming meetings to address them.
- Suggestions for on-street parking and clearer parking regulations.
- Concerns about multi-unit developments increasing traffic congestion and longer travel times to major roads like the QEW.
- Suggestion for a roundabout at Bronte/Lakeshore intersection to improve traffic flow and safety.
- Reports of people avoiding Bronte due to parking difficulties.

Community Identity

- Mixed feelings about Bronte Village adopting a similar identity to Downtown Oakville; many prefer a distinct Bronte Village character.
- Desire for unique streetscape elements, like interesting light standards and more green infrastructure, to enhance the village's charm.

Public Spaces and Amenities

- Enhancement of Market Square with more seating, flowers, arts and craft markets, and art installations representative of Bronte's heritage.
- Under-maintenance of small parks on East/Marine St. and Nelson/Marine St., with calls for more frequent upkeep.
- Suggestions for more amenities like dog parks by the waterfront, shaded seating areas, and more pedestrian-friendly walkways.
- Need for permanent structures like pergolas in Market Square for shade and social gatherings.
- More public art installations, sculptures, and murals to enhance the village atmosphere.
- Reports of new park benches giving a good feeling and enhancing the area.

Streetscape Improvements

- Introduction of traffic calming measures, such as a centre median with planters on Lakeshore, to reduce speeding and improve pedestrian safety.
- Pedestrianization of Bronte and reduction of speeds on Lakeshore to make the area more walkable.
- Concerns about construction disruptions affecting businesses.
- Requests for more street trees and improved lighting to enhance the village atmosphere.

Connectivity and Infrastructure

- Discussion on bridging the gap between the east and west sides of Bronte Creek, possibly with a pedestrian bridge over Bronte Creek.
- Improving connectivity to the Bronte GO station with better walking and cycling paths.

Wayfinding and Signage

- Need for clear wayfinding signs at each end of Lakeshore to guide visitors to Bronte Village.
- Improved signage for amenities like beaches, playgrounds, and public washrooms.
- Improvement of the "Bronte Waves" sign and other elements that are representative of Bronte Village.

Safety and Maintenance

- Safety concerns at the Lakeshore bridge for pedestrians and cyclists.
- Need for regular maintenance of heritage sites and better upkeep of public amenities to preserve the village's historical and aesthetic value.

On-street parking seems like a huge waste; progressive cities all over the world are trying to reclaim car space





5.0 Next Steps

The team received input to advance the overall public realm framework for Bronte Village by making green connections to the harbour, the Bronte Athletic Park and the Bronte Heritage Waterfront Park. Many ideas were shared with the team which will be used to inform the development of the streetscape concept options for Lakeshore Road and Bronte Road. We heard support for a streetscape that was distinct from Downtown Oakville, enhanced tree/landscape planting, more shaded seating and better wayfinding and signage. The team also heard a lot of ideas for Market Square including suggestions for events and activities, more variety in the landscape and need for shade structures.

The team will continue to reach out to business owners and other stakeholders in Bronte Village over the coming months.

The team is advancing to Phase 4 of the project. The next round of public engagement will occur in the fall of 2024 when the team will present options to consider for the streetscapes and suggestions for Market Square.
